

FIND SLAIN GIRL IN CISTERN.

Lizzie Fulhart's Body in Burlap Bag at Dayton.

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 5.—Another murder mystery has been added to the long list in this city. Late this afternoon the body of a young woman was dragged out of a cistern in the rear of a vacant house. Her brother has identified her as Lizzie Fulhart, 18 years old, of Vandalia, Ohio. She had always borne a good reputation at her home. She came to this city on Jan. 29 to look for employment and was staying with her aunt, Mrs. Deeters.

The discovery was made by Charles O. Weaver, a contractor, who was employed by the owner of the Matthews residence, on North Jefferson Street, near Second, to prepare the residence for occupancy. While examining the cistern, Weaver noticed what appeared to be a bundle of clothing floating on the water, which was only two feet below the surface of the ground. With a garden hoe he attempted to lift the bundle and uncovered the girl's feet, when he called the police.

The body was badly discolored. The face shows bruises and other evidences of violence. A burlap bag enshrouded the upper part of the body.

The girl left her aunt's home in the morning in search of work and was expected to return for dinner at noon, and the fact that she failed to do so indicated that she was enticed into the vacant house and there murdered. If this murder occurred on Jan. 29, it followed that of Mary Forschner only about a week, and the police now fear that both crimes were the work of the same man.

Albert Wilkie, employed at the Davis Sewing Machine Factory, was arrested here to-night on suspicion. Wilkie was the sweetheart of the murdered girl, but says he has not seen her since she came to the city.

DIED UNDER X-SCIENCE.

Coroner Indignant About the End of Well-to-Do Mrs. Beatty.

Mrs. Mary C. Beatty, 68 years old, a well-to-do widow, who lived with her brother, M. J. Hawk, and his wife at 112 West 103d Street, became seriously ill two days ago after suffering for two years with asthma. Several months ago she decided that she wanted to try Christian Science treatment, so when the serious attack occurred she asked her sister-in-law to send for Mrs. Frank Du Pay Veiller of 46 West Ninety-sixth Street.

This Mrs. Hawk did, not believing Mrs. Beatty's condition so serious. Mrs. Hawk left her home yesterday to attend to her and her husband's hardware business at 335 Broadway. When she got back last night she found Mrs. Beatty on the floor dead.

Coroner Harburger will hold an inquest to-day and summon all the Christian Scientists who have had anything to do with the case to testify. The Coroner said he was indignant.
